


Seasonal Jobs

Seasonal jobs are available throughout the year, though most hiring takes place during the summer and the winter holidays. Companies, especially retail and transportation, hire workers for the busy holiday season. Resorts hire workers for both ski season and the summer.

What Is Seasonal Employment?

Seasonal employment is employment that does not continue year-round but usually recurs. Many positions are only necessary during certain times of year so workers will only be employed during that time.

Seasonal jobs are temporary and short-term by definition. For example, retailers hire extra workers for the holiday season, tax preparation firms hire employees for tax season, ski resorts hire workers during winter ski season, and amusement parks hire summer seasonal workers.

Positions in this type of employment can vary from sports and outdoor workers, to racing and holiday-related retail work, seasonal attractions, fishing expeditions, etc.

For retail hiring, Christmas is the busiest retail season of the year. Employers start hiring additional staff to ring the cash registers in the fall.

Christmas Job Overview

Seasonal Christmas jobs are temporary or short term positions offered during the winter holiday season. Examples of seasonal winter jobs include sales representatives and greeters. Some positions are exclusive to the Christmas holiday, such as Santa Claus impersonators and Christmas tree specialists.

The majority of winter holiday jobs are available for the month of December only. The first one to two weeks are devoted to planning and preparation, and the third week up to the end of the holiday season is spent catering to consumers. An example of an industry that follows this timeline is hospitality. After the Christmas season is over, employees are usually relieved from their positions.

Seasonal Christmas Job Education Requirements

Seasonal Christmas jobs education requirements are straightforward and easy to meet. Most positions do not require work experience. Furthermore, individuals without a college degree can fill the bulk of seasonal Christmas jobs.

Because of this, companies have been known to target students and individuals who are seeking immediate employment. For technical or senior roles, recruiters may give priority to candidates with relevant work experience.

Logistics specialists, team leaders and part-time marketing jobs are positions that may require a college degree.

Seasonal Christmas Job Market

The seasonal Christmas jobs market is favorable for individuals seeking opportunities to supplement their income temporarily during the winter holiday season. Large companies that engage in mass seasonal recruitment include Target, Macy's, and Toys R Us. Individuals who are interested in applying for seasonal Christmas jobs can easily find vacant openings via employment websites, local newspapers, and flyers. In order to meet their quota, many recruiters encourage applicants to bring a friend during the employment process, or to recommend qualified candidates for various openings. It is also common for recruiters to offer incentives such as bonuses for successful recommended hires.




Seasonal Christmas Job Salary Information

Seasonal Christmas jobs vary depending on job responsibilities. Part-time customer service and back room jobs can bring is roughly \$8.85/hr to \$9.40/hr. Overnight stockers, shift supervisors, and merchandise coordinators can earn between \$11.04/hr and 13.50/hr.

Additional compensation heavily depends on company policy. Most jobs in the food and hospitality industry provide tips, while sales-oriented jobs offer commissions and performance bonuses. Overtime pay is subject to approval by the employer and comes with a higher pay rate. Salary increases and promotions for seasonal Christmas jobs are rare. On the other hand, incentives such as discounts and priority purchases are common.

Kelly Services, Snelling & Snelling and Manpower all provide searchable databases of temporary positions. Temping is one of the fastest growing employment sectors in the country and the range of available positions has increased significantly.

One of the advantages of temp work is that you can do it on your schedule. The IRS and state tax departments need help in processing tax returns starting in early January. Government Jobs has links to federal, state and local governmental agencies.


Make money for the holidays.
